NĀ KULEANA O KA HAUMĀNA

E ho‘okumu ‘ia ana he Waihona Google no ka papa a me ka Faila ho‘okahi no kēlā me kēia haumāna. Ma laila e waiho ‘ia ai nā ha‘awina kākau e ka haumāna; ma laila ho‘i e ho‘iho‘i ‘ia ai e ke kumu, a ‘ike ‘ia ke kaha.

Ka Heluhelu a me ka Hāpai Mana‘o (15%)

I kēlā me kēia pule, e loa‘a ana nō ka ha‘awina heluhelu. ‘O kekahī, he mau puke/‘atikala a ka haumāna e noi‘i ai no kāna papahana laeo‘o pono‘i. ‘O kekahī ho‘i, he mau pepa nui laeo‘o i kākau ‘ē ‘ia a puka mua ho‘i. Ma hope o ka heluhelu ‘ana, e hāpai ka haumāna i kekahī mana‘o hoihoi āna i ‘ike ai, ma ke ‘ano he pepa pōkole i kikokiko ‘ia a waiho ‘ia ma ka Waihona Google. Ma ‘ane‘i e hō‘ike mua ai ka haumāna i kekahī mau mana‘o i ho‘oulu ‘ia ma o kona heluhelu ‘ana, nā nīnau i kupu maila, a me kona kālailai ‘ana i nā mea i heluhelu ‘ia. (1-2 ‘ao‘ao)

Ka Papa Hō‘ulu‘ulu Kūmole (10%)

I ka māhele ‘elua o ke kau, e ho‘omōhala ana ka haumāna i ke kumu hana o kāna papahana noi‘i laeo‘o, me ke kōkua nō ho‘i o ke kumu a me nā hoa papa ona. I ia wā like, e ‘imi ‘o ia a loa‘a he 10-15 kumu ‘ike i pili i kāna papahana, a e ho‘omākaukau nō i Papa Hō‘ulu‘ulu Kūmole. E a‘o mua ‘ia kēia hana i loko o ka papa, a ma laila nō e ho‘omaka ai i ka hana. Ho‘oulu a ho‘oponopono ‘ia no ka hā‘awi pū ‘ana me ka palapala noi laeo‘o i ka hopena o ke kau.

Ka Ho‘omōhala Noi Laoe‘o (20%)

E lilo ana kekahī hapa o ke kau i ke kākau a me ka ho‘omōhala ‘ana i ka palapala noi laeo‘o, i pa‘a pono i ka hopena o kēia papa. No kēia māhele o ka papa, e loa‘a ana nō kekahī mau ha‘awina kākau, i hana ‘ia ma ka papa a i ‘ole ma ka hale.

Penei ana kekahī o nā ha‘awina (me ka hiki ke loli ma hope aku):

- ka hāpai mua ‘ana i ke kumu hana noi‘i (1 paukū)
- ka ho‘omōhala ‘ana i ke kumu hana noi‘i a me ka pahuhopu o ka pepa (1 ‘ao‘ao)
- ke kākau mua ‘ana i ka ‘ōlelo ho‘olauna o ka pepa (3 ‘ao‘ao)
- ke kākau a me ka ho‘omōhala ‘ana i kekahī mau māhele o ka palapala noi laeo‘o, e like me ka mea e mana‘o ai he pono

Ke Alaka‘i ‘Ana i ka Papa (15%)

E koho kēlā me kēia haumāna i ho‘okahi papa e alaka‘i ai, a me ka pepa noi‘i laeo‘o e heluhelu ‘ia i ia pule. Nāna e ha‘i ‘ōlelo no nā minuke he iwakālua, me ka hō‘ike ‘ana mai i kekahī mau mana‘o o loko o ka pepa. Nāna nō ho‘i e alaka‘i i ke kūkākama‘ilio ‘ana o ka papa no nā minuke he kanakolu paha ma hope aku.

Ka Palapala Noi Laoe‘o (20%)

Haku ‘ia no ka hopena o ke kau. (Aia ka lō‘ihī i ke ‘ano o ka papahana noi‘i.)

Ka Hele ‘Ana i ka Papa me ka Hana Pū (20%)

‘Ae ‘ia ka hala ‘ana o 2 papa, me ke emi ‘ole mai o ke kaha. Ke hala ka 3, emi ke kaha Hana Papa he 3%, a emi mai he 3% hou no kēlā me kēia papa i hala i ka haumāna. Ke hala ka ‘elima o ka papa, he "F" ka hopena no ke kau.
