COURSE DESCRIPTION

HAW 601 Kakau Mo'olelo: Analyzes various genres of written Hawaiian literature. HAW majors only. Pre: graduate standing and 402, or consent.

NĀ PAHUHOPU O KĒIA PAPA

Ke puka ka haumāna mai kēia papa, e ma'a ana iā ia:

- nā loina Hawai'i no ka ho'omaopopo a me ka wehewehe 'ana i nā mele a me nā mo'olelo o Hawai'i nei
- ke kālāi mana'o 'ana i ke mele a me ka mo'olelo Hawai'i
- ke 'ano o ka ho'opāpā na'auao o nā mea kākau Hawai'i, ma ke kenekulia iwakālua, a i ka wā nei nō
- ka ho'ākāka 'ana i ka waiwai o ke kākau mo'olelo a me ka ho'opa'a loina kākau.

NĀ KULEANA HAUMĀNA

Ka Heluhelu a me ke Kālāi Mana'o (25%)

I kēlā me kēia pule, e loa'a ana kekahi mau mea e heluhelu ai. A i kēlā me kēia pule, he mau kuleana ko nā haumāna ke pau ka heluhelu 'ana.

- **Kālāi Mana'o.** Ma hope o ka heluhelu 'ana, e kākau ka haumāna i pepa, a e ho'ouka 'ia ma ka Waihona Google o ka papa.
 - Mai loko mai o nā mea i heluhelu 'ia no kekahi papa, e unuhi (*not "translate"*) ka haumāna i kekahi paukū hoihoi a waiwai ho'i. Kikokiko hou

‘ia kēlā paukū, a ma lalo iho ona, e kālailai ka haumāna i nā mana‘o a me ka ‘ike i hāpai ‘ia i loko o laila. Ma ‘ane‘i e hō‘ike mua ai ka haumāna i kekahi mau mana‘o i ho‘oulu ‘ia ma o kona heluhelu ‘ana, nā nīnau i kupu maila, a me kona kālailai ‘ana i nā mea i heluhelu ‘ia.

- 1-2 ‘ao‘ao. Kikokiko hou: lele ‘ole ka laina. Kālailai: lele ka laina.
 - Ho‘ouka ‘ia ma Laulima ma mua o ka hola 10 o ka pō ma mua o ka papa (ka Lāpule). E ho‘omākaukau nō ho‘i no ka wehewehe ‘ana i kou mau mana‘o i mua o ka papa (a e nui a‘e ho‘i ma luna o ka mea i loa‘a ma kāu pepa).
- **Pane.** E heluhelu i nā pepa i kākau ‘ia e nā hoa papa, a e ho‘omākaukau aku i mau nīnau a i pane ho‘i e hāpai ai i loko o ka papa, ma hope o ko iala wehewehe ‘ana i kona mau mana‘o. Mai laila mai e ulu ai ke kama‘ilio ‘ana i loko o ka papa.

Nā Pepa Li‘ili‘i a me nā Hō‘ike‘ike (25%)

‘Elua pepa li‘ili‘i no ke kālailai ‘ana i kekahi mana‘o nui i ‘upu a‘e ma loko o ka papa. ‘O ka mua, e koho ka haumāna i mele e wehewehe ai, e like me nā loea o ka wā ma mua. ‘O ka lua ho‘i, no ka pilina o kekahi puke kāko‘o me nā mea e kama‘ilio ‘ia ana i loko o kēia papa. No kēia mau pepa, e ho‘ili‘ili ka haumāna i ka ‘ike mai nā mea i heluhelu ‘ia ma ka papa, i mea e kāko‘o ai i kona mana‘o nui. E ‘imi nō ho‘i ‘o ia i ‘ike hou aku inā he kūpono. E ho‘omākaukau nō ho‘i ‘o ia i ha‘i ‘ōlelo hō‘ike‘ike no ka hō‘oia ‘ana i kona mau mana‘o i mua o ka papa.

- Pepa: 8-10 ‘ao‘ao pākahi, lele ka laina. Ho‘okomo ‘ia ma kāu Faila Google i ka pō ma mua o ka hui ‘ana o ka papa.
- Ha‘i ‘Ōlelo Hō‘ike‘ike: 10-15 minuke

Ka Pepa Noi‘i a me ka Hō‘ike‘ike (25%)

E kākau ka haumāna i pepa no ka noi‘i ‘ana i kekahi mea e kāko‘o a ho‘ākāka ho‘i i kekahi mana‘o a nīnau paha i pili i ka *literature* a ka Hawai‘i. Hana mua ‘ia ka ‘ōlelo hō‘ulu‘ulu (*abstract*) a me kekahi ‘oloke‘a (*outline*). Hō‘ike‘ike ka haumāna i ka hua i loa‘a ma ka pule hope o ka papa.

- Pepa: 20 ‘ao‘ao. Ho‘okomo ‘ia ma ka Faila Google. Palena pau: 15 Kēkēmapa, hola 4.
- Ha‘i ‘Ōlelo Hō‘ike‘ike: 15-20 minuke (TBD)

Ka Hana Papa (25%)

‘Ae ‘ia ka hala ‘ana o 2 papa, me ke emi ‘ole mai o ke kaha. Ke hala ka 3, emi ke kaha Hana Papa he 3%, a emi mai he 3% hou no kēlā me kēia papa i hala i ka haumāna. Ke hala ka ‘elima o ka papa, he "F" ka hopena no ke kau.
